




## Hard Work

Running the business is clearly hard work, the shop is open 7 days a week and he regularly works 6 of those. There are frustrations of course. Aidy explained how difficult it is sometimes to naviaate risina costs of running the business and Brexit red tape impacting online sales overseas. As a small business maintaining credit with record distributors can be a challenge.

However he still relishes it. It's made worthwhile by occasions like an album signing a couple of years ago by Philip Selway, the drummer of the mighty Radiohead. This saw people queuing up Park Road and around the block to meet him and buy his record. Aidy is keen to grow and promote his business further, for example by tapping into the trend for bigger bands to hold intimate gigs for fans who preorder their latest album. But the shop is not big enough for that, and securing a suitable local venue at a viable cost is proving challenging.

I asked Aidy about the enduring appeal of a format that has seen a massive resurgence in recent years, in spite of the streamers – just under 6 million vinyl albums in the UK in 2023. He thought people really valued ownership in a world where music has never been more accessible through streaming platforms such as Spotify. These still have a place here, and he sometimes sees people looking through the racks whilst listening to a potential purchase on headphones, removing some of the risks of buying music that existed in the past. Which is important when a new record can cost over £20, and significantly more for double albums and special editions.

### Record Store Day

Aidv has embraced Record Store Day (RSD) full-on in recent years, a day in late April each year that brings together fans, artists and over 270 independent UK record stores to celebrate their unique culture. And of course to shift some records. My first visit to Five Rise was on RSD 2023, and I was amazed to see the shop full of people browsing and chatting.

A lively DJ set in the afternoon and a set from a local musician in the evening made for a brisk day's trade for Aidy and his small team, and a great buzz in the shop all day. Aidy is already starting work in preparation for RSD 2025.
